Teaching & Learning I hope that the half-term break has been kind to you all and you coping well as families during the ongoing measures. I appreciate that you'll have concerns and questions about how you can be supporting your children at this time, so I hope that you find the two simple tips below helpful. As always, if you have any questions or concerns, please just ask your teachers; we will be very happy to help.

Literacy and the importance of talk

Much is said about the importance of literacy - rightly so. However, this can be a cause of worry sometimes, especially as people can think that this relates purely to technical issues of reading and writing.

Well, in the words of one study, 'talk is the foundation of literacy.' Please do not underestimate the importance of talk at home. Your child listening to you and talking with you forms a vital part in their literacy development. Make the time to just talk. Go on a walk and leave phones behind. Parents invariably know many things that children don't (that's what makes them always right) so be brave and actually teach your child something new, whether it be about your family history, your own memories and experiences at school, an interest or hobby you have ... it doesn't really matter. The point is that children benefit from these conversations because they learn the skills of listening, forming and asking questions, and applying words in a new way.

Effective questions

Whilst children are learning a range of new things at school - including things that as parents we might find daunting and challenging - it is easy to keep questions simple. Basic questions, such as those that start with 'what' or 'when', form the basis of understanding, because they check on key facts. However, if you want to support your child to the next level, ask them questions that start with the words 'who', 'why' and 'how', and include the words 'would/could', 'will' and 'might'. For example, 'What is the date the First World War started?' is a basic level question with only one answer, but asking a question like, 'How might Britain have avoided being involved in the First World War?' will prompt thoughts in new directions. The best thing about this level of questioning for you as parents is that you don't need the answers; you are merely supporting your child to talk about their learning and develop their literacy.
